

Two Winonans and Cochrane Man Are Sentenced at Alma

Alois Jung, William Partlow Get One to Two-Year Terms.

Alma, Wis.—(Special to The Republican-Herald)—William Partlow and Alois T. Jung of Winona and Beaumont J. Hoter of Cochrane, Wis., who entered pleas of guilty to charges of breaking into and entering the George Engel tavern at Cochrane early Saturday morning were sentenced here Tuesday afternoon by County Judge G. L. Pattison.

Jung was given an indeterminate term of not less than one year and not more than two years in the state prison at Waupun while Partlow was sentenced to an indeterminate term of not less than one year and not more than two years in the state reformatory near Green Bay.

Hofer was sentenced to an indeternmate term of not less than one year and not more than two years and six months in the state prison at Waupun. Hofer was out on parole for passing bad checks at Janesville. Wis., at the time of his arrest.

Sheriff Henry Rhyner and Deputy Sheriff Alvin Accola took Hoter and Jung to Waupun this morning while the sheriff will take Partlow, 22, to Green Bay Thursday.

Hoter and Jung were arrested Saturday afternoon at the Conrad airport tayern, west of Winona on highway 61, by Sheriff Ben Zimmerman of Winona county after Jung's car was recognized as having been the machine seen in the vicinity of Cochrane after the burglary. Partlow was arrested at Winona in the business section about 10:30 a.m. Sunday by Patrolman Stanley Duncanson.

The trio had been recognized at Cochrane after the robbery and Jung's car tire tracks corresponded to those found near the tavern where they got between \$8 and \$10 in cash and a quantity of whisky. They broke into the tavern by smashing the window in the front door,
